### Sr Regina Celebrates 70th Jubilee

Not many people celebrate their 70th anniversary. The Benedictine Sisters are happy to announce that Sister Regina has reached that impressive milestone on the Solemnity of St. Scholastica, February 10, 2025. She will be celebrating with her community with a Jubilee Mass and dinner.

Sister Regina was born April 23, 1935, to Charles Simon Rausch and Marie (Henscheid) Rausch. Her brother, Bernard (Father Nicholas Rausch,

OSB) was the eldest followed by Anna Mae (Sister Dorothy), Genevieve (Sister Christine) and Elizabeth (who died in infancy). Regina was followed by Gertrude (Rausch) Stuart.

Sister Regina attended St. Nicholas Church in Rupert, ID, as a child and attended public grade and high school there. After entering the monastery in Mt. Angel, she continued her education at Mt. Angel College and summer school at Mt. Angel Seminary, earning a Bachelor's from Mt. Angel College.

Her sisters, Sisters Dorothy and Christine, had already become members of Queen of Angels. When they were ready for Perpetual Profession, Sister Regina was ready to make her First Profession. On February 10, 1955, all three professed together. In the sanctuary, among the clergy, were their brother, Frater Nicholas, and Father Conrad, their cousin. At that time, Regina was given the name Sister Scholastica. Sister Regina made her Perpetual Profession on February 10, 1958. She later returned to her baptismal name, Regina.

Sister Regina has served in a variety of ministries during her community life mostly as a primary school teacher in Catholic schools in: Oregon City, Silverton, Portland (Sacred Heart), Hayward, CA, Lebanon, Woodburn, and Albany. She also taught Religious Vacation School in the summers of 1956-85. While in Albany, she served as Eucharistic Minister at Masses and brought the Eucharist to the sick in the hospital and their homes. In 2001, after teaching for 45 years, she worked in the vocation program of the monastery, served as sacristan and was a member of the liturgy committee.

Sister Regina is gifted at working with children. She especially enjoyed preparing

children for First Communion and working with the Religious Education Coordinator. In Albany, Sister Regina and the coordinator involved the parents in the First Communion program and received the Mustard Seed Award in Baltimore, MD, for the one-hundred percent parental involvement in the program.

## Epping Family Honored

On November 11, 2024, Veterans Days, Catholic Community
Services and the Benedictine Sisters honored the Larry and Jeanette
Epping Family for their outstanding generous support of the Benedictine Sisters and Catholic Community
Services. They also paid tribute to
Larry Epping for his selfless service as a member of the armed forces.



Representatives from Catholic Community Services, the

Benedictine Sisters, Father Bernard Youth Center, and Chesterton Academy gathered near the orchard on the southeast corner of the monastery grounds. A small Giant Sequoia tree was planted to symbolize Larry and Jeanette's legacy of love which took rooted at the monastery and continues as a source of hope and renewal through the generous support of their family foundation. It also marks the beginning of a new chapter for Queen of Angels Monastery under the auspices of Catholic Community Services.

Near the newly planted sequoia and under the cover of a line of cedar trees, a memorial bench was placed. It symbolically marks the spot where Larry and Jeanette Epping met. Over the years, the Larry & Jeanette Epping Family Foundation has contributed significant funds and resources to the Benedictine Sisters for their monastery and to Catholic Community Services. Larry and Jeanette's son, Gary, who represents the foundation, spoke to the crowd virtually. He shared the story of how his parents met, and the importance that Mount Angel and Queen of Angels Monastery had for them.



After a special ceremony, attendees were invited for a reception in the newly renovated maintenance workshop that will become the new home of Mission Benedict. It marks the first Catholic Community Services ministry to move to Queen of Angels Monastery since the sale and transfer of the property on December 26, 2023. Construction is currently taking place in the monastery's north wing, the future home of St. Joseph Shelter and Father Taaffe Homes and Pregnancy Support Services for new mothers and their babies.

The new Giant Sequoia and memorial bench are open to the public.

### Way of the Cross Restoration



An oblate and local carpenter have embarked on a project to refurbish and replace all elements of the Way of the Cross, the devotion of following Jesus' journey to the place of his crucifixion, that lines the path leading to the sisters' cemetery. Each of the 15 individual stations was painted and crafted by Sister Angela Meister, OSB, almost 25 years ago, and have been damaged by weather and the passage of time. Sr. Angela also created the "Resurrection Station," since the resurrection of Jesus is the central mystery of the Christian faith.

Featuring a state-of-the-art UV printing method commonly used to assure the longevity of outdoor signage, our project will honor Sister Angela's work and preserve a vital part of the Monastery's artistic and spiritual legacy. Oblate Susan Black and Fred Vandecoevering are leading the project. It is expected to be completed in early 2025.

## Sisters Launch Legacy Appeal

One of the most common questions we have received since we announced the sale and transfer of our property at 840 South Main Street has been about the monastery cemetery. Over 200 sisters and oblates are buried there, including our foundress, Mother Bernardine Wachter. The small plot of land sits on a bluff on the south end of the property and has been the eternal resting place of our monastic community members since 1888.

Today, like the rest of the property and grounds, the cemetery has new caretakers. Before the sale of the property became final, an endowment was established to ensure the cemetery could be maintained long after the last sister is buried. The care of the cemetery is entrusted to St. Mary Parish, Mount Angel, and the sisters are grateful for the care of their cemetery.

While the cost of the overall care and maintenance of the cemetery is sustained by the endowment, there remains substantial expenses related to the funeral and final repose of our sisters. A simple funeral costs our community an estimated \$8,000 - \$10,000 per sister. This expense is not covered by the endowment. There are currently 17 sisters who will, in time, be laid to rest at Queen of Angels cemetery.

Earlier this year, the sisters launched a Legacy Appeal to help fund this need. ### & Support our Retired Sisters

The Benedictine Sisters of Mt. Angel have dedicated themselves to a religious calling, serving others with selfless compassion, faith, and devotion. As they enter their retirement years, the community faces financial uncertainties. These courageous women have spent their lives in service to others in need and now deserve our support.

Sr. Dorothy Jean Beyer is the second oldest of seven children. She was born to William J. Beyer and Delphine (Ebner) Beyer, on February 7, 1943, in Silverton, Oregon. She was baptized at St. Mary Church in Mount Angel, Oregon. She attended St. Mary Grade School and Mt. Angel Academy in Mount Angel. The Benedictine Sisters taught Sr. Dorothy Jean in the primary grades as well as in her secondary education. She grew up in the shadow of the monastery; she and her family lived across the street. Sr. Dorothy Jean entered the monastery on September 3, 1961, as a postulant. She professed her monastic promises on July 11, 1963.



Her first teaching assignment was 5th and 6th grades at St. Paul's Catholic School in Silverton, Oregon. In 1968, she became both a teacher and principal of the school. From 1969-85, Sr. Dorothy Jean served as part-time 6th grade teacher and principal of St. Luke School in Woodburn, Oregon. From 1985-87, she taught freshmen and sophomore religion as a department chairperson at St. Mary Academy in Portland, Oregon.

From 1987-95, she served as prioress of the Benedictine Sisters, and again from 1999 to 2007. She led a successful \$6.2 million capital fundraising campaign to repair and rebuild the monastery, chapel, and Shalom Prayer Center after the 1993 earthquake.

Sister Dorothy Jean was the director of the Shalom Prayer Center from 1998-99, and again from 2008-2011. Since 2016, she has served as the coordinator of Shalom at the Monastery retreat ministry, retreat presenter, spiritual director and supervisor as well as the Donor Relations officer for the Mission Advancement Office. Since 2018, she has served on the St. Joseph Shelter Advisory Committee. Since 2012, she has been the coordinator of the Ministry to the Sick and Homebound/ Prayer Shawl ministry at St. Mary Catholic Church.

Sister Dorothy Jean enjoys photography, especially of nature, crocheting, and reading. When asked to reflect on her 60th Jubilee, Sr. Dorothy Jean said, "God has blessed me in so many ways throughout my life. Too many blessings to count. On the top of my list are my parents, my brothers and sisters and their families. I am grateful for all that God has given me, especially my Benedictine monastic vocation. I have dedicated my life to God and to be of service to others. This is what I have tried to do."

## Mt. Angel College Reunion

From the very beginning in Gervais, 1882, the Benedictine Sisters began education for boys and girls at St. Scholastica Academy. When the sisters moved to Mount Angel, the Mt. Angel Academy and Normal Schools relocated there as well in 1888. In 1947, the Normal school was named Mt. Angel Women's College and in 1958, when the school became co-ed, the name was changed to Mt. Angel College. Sadly, in 1973, the college closed.



In the fall of 2023, George Fisher and others had the thought of staging another reunion of everyone who had attended the college. It had been ten years since the last reunion and the alumni were all getting a little older. The last reunion was a grand affair and enjoyed by all. Planning took several months, but the group of over 80 alumni met at the Father Bernard Youth Center, the former commons, on September 7, 2024.

Beginning in early 2023, the Benedictine Sisters began their move to Providence Benedictine Nursing Center's Orchard House. Before this move, Judy Gaboury led the Supportive Care Center in the monastery's north wing. She led a small group of caregivers who provided around-the-clock care for any of the sisters who needed it. Some were short-term members recovering from an illness or surgery; others were long-term residents needing assistance for day-to-day activities.





The care team went from three members and Judy, to just Judy. Today, her title is the Sisters Services Coordinator. It is a title that fails to convey the important work she does for the sisters every day.

In this role, Judy coordinates activities, manages appointments, coordinates travel arrangements, and assists the sisters with other tasks as needed. Again, these words don't encompass everything she does. Some days, in addition to her regular work, you may find her visiting with Sr. Alice Ann and Sr. Angela at the PBNC. She helps plan and put on monthly birthday gatherings and celebrations. She even bakes goodies for the sisters when she can.

### 🥯 Sr. Marilyn Schwab Lecture





# Celebrating Founder's Day

Did you know that Queen of Angels Monastery is one of the first stops on the over 3-mile-long Mount Angel Heritage Trail? The route highlights the city's most historically significant locations. There are two historical marker placed on the monastery grounds, one of them marks the location of Mount Angel Academy and Normal School.

A fitting tribute for a monastic community with a deep history in education. Sister Joeine Darrington, for example, is one of many sisters who dedicated her life to education. After attending Mount Angel Normal School, she joined the Benedictine Sisters in 1934, making her final profession in 1937. Her teaching career began in Mount Angel, where she taught elementary and high school before becoming principal of Mount Angel Academy. She would go on to have an extensive teaching career, with stops at Mount Angel



College, Montana State College (in Bozeman), and finally in an elementary school in Molalla.

Now, all of our sister-educators are retired; they fondly remember their many students. They continue their monastic work of prayer, hospitality and service in different ways at Providence Benedictine's Orchard House and at Mount Angel Towers. While they may not do so in a traditional classroom, many of them continue to educate members of the community by sharing their amazing stories of dedication. In today's world, this is truly God's work and the Benedictine Sisters continue to answer the call.


